


Why Community Scale?

Efficient and Cost- Saving


Builds Political Economy




Communities of Color Live in Areas with Great Solar Potential

Barriers to True Energy Democracy

- Lack of Property Ownership
- Lack of Inclusion in Local Planning Processes
- Lack of Technical and Legal Capacity Support
- Lack of Access to Capital and Financing



Federal Solutions to Achieve True Energy Democracy

- > Set a national standard for Feed-in Tariff payments that support community-scale projects, particularly in environmental justice communities.
- ➤ Pilot Energy Independence Districts jointly supported by DOE and EPA in areas with high poverty, poor health outcomes, low educational attainment, old housing stock, and environmental injustice.
- > Establish matching grant opportunities to support EID innovation through the proposed Energy Trust.
